Whether you're buying for a reader in your life or finding a few titles for your own holiday break there's a little something for everyone.






<u>Awe-Samosas!</u> by Marzieh Abbas, illustrated by Bhagya Madanasinghe

belongs.







Bear's Big Idea by Sandra Nickel, illustrated by Il Sung Na

<u>Being Home</u> by Traci Sorell, illustrated by Michaela Goade








Bye Land, Bye Sea by René Spencer, illustrated by Rodolfo Montalyo






Don't Wash Winston by Ashley Belote







<u>Home In a Lunchbox</u> by Cherry Mo

How do you throw the world's best tantrum? Here are ten ways to help little ones navigate big feelings using fun, calming exercises.







<u>Like So</u> by Ruth Forman, illustrated by Raissa Figueroa

The natural world is full of patterns to enjoy for those who can ground themselves, be mindful, and truly see.






Lucky Duck by Greg Pizzoli

Come see just how lucky Susan is, in this slyly funny story about finding luck when you least expect it.

<u>Mama in the Moon</u> by Doreen Cronin and Brian Cronin

One night he tumbles from her arms to land in a soft patch of leaves far below. "I'll be there soon," Mama sloth calls down to him. But sloths never get anywhere soon. Baby becomes worried, but Mama finds clever ways to reassure and distract him using his senses of sight, sound, smell, and touch.





No Cats In the Library by Lauren Emmons



Two curious bunnies enjoy watching clouds go by. But when they look at the sky, they each see something completely different! While one bunny likes to use his imagination, the other bunny can only see the science behind them.

Together they learn that cloud watching is much more fun when they can see it through each other's eyes.

A cautious porcupine summons the courage to stand up to threats both real and imagined, reassuring readers that they, too, can face their fears.


Rocket Ship, Solo Trip by Chiara Colombi,


Meet Sandcastle. Sandcastle's world was new and exciting until their very first... SQUISH!






The Three Little Tardigrades: A Slightly Scientific





Time to Make Art by Jeff Mack





Trunk Goes Thunk: A Woodland Tale of Opposites





Walkies: A Dog's Tale by Estrela Lourenço


